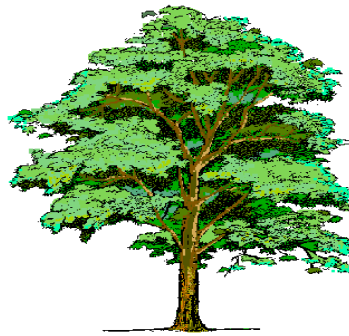

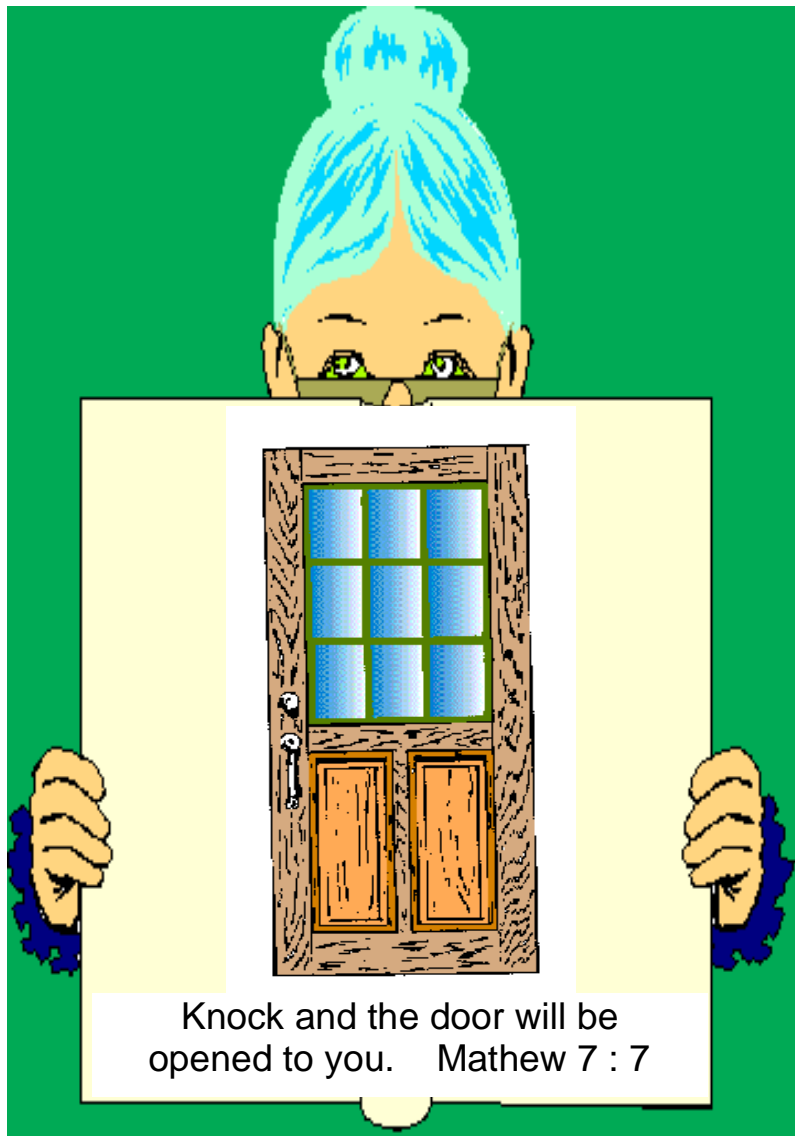

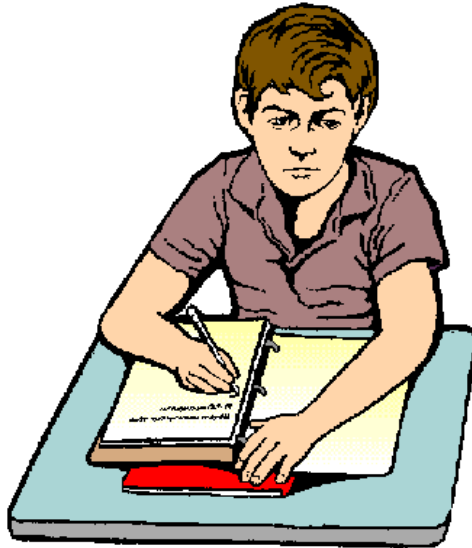

UNITY

A few years ago I read a story about a church minister in America. He was an older man who had moved to lead a small local community church, the kind of church where everyone knows everyone.

All seemed to be going smoothly until a few years in he learned of two elderly ladies who over a number of years had an increasingly fractious relationship.

It got to the point where the two ladies no longer talked, where other members of the congregations were picking sides to support the lady they agreed with. There are no records of what the original disagreement was, but it had grown to the point of utter separation. At its worst point both of the ladies refused to take part in communion as they were not in unity with one another.

Surely a horrible experience for this minister to try and deal with. The leader set about trying to put things right, but was met with stubbornness. No matter what he tried, whether it was mediation or intervention that he had learned from his time studying and speaking to more experienced pastors. Nothing seemed to be able to reconcile these two individuals.

A few months down the line, with this argument still on going, tragedy struck as the church building burned down, a small fire that started near the altar and spread through the whole building making it unusable until the repairs were made. It just felt like nothing was going well for this church, divided by people's disagreements, destroyed by the loss of a physical building.

But, that's not where the story ends, the next issue they faced was that the minister was arrested. I wonder what you think the arrest

was linked to. Does your thought change when you learn that he was charged and pleaded guilty to the crime? Sentenced to time in prison and relieved of his duties in the church.

The surprising thing, I think, is that he was arrested and imprisoned for arson. In a bid to create a small building project which he had planned to use as a means to create unity through working parties and fundraising activities, the minister started a small fire. That fire grew out of control and caused a huge amount of damage. His intentions were good, but his actions were questionable. It won't surprise you that the goal of unity was never met in that church, there was no reconciliation, and with no building to meet in the congregation spread to other local churches.

Ironically, church unity is a lot like a fire. A fire needs 3 things to start up and to keep it going; fuel, oxygen and heat, these are called the fire triangle. The church too has its own unity triangle, three things that are needed to keep the flames of unity burning strong. The Church needs you, me and God. If you take out any of those then there is a lack of unity. And the elements of "you" and "me" can be as an individual (literally me, you and God can create unity between us) or as a group, perhaps between denominations or perhaps like in the story above, it needs to be between two groups within the same church.

It's worth noting that the chemical reaction of making a fire (combustion) will change both the oxygen and the fuel in to new compounds, water vapour & carbon-dioxide as well as whatever is left over, often carbon but sometimes other fumes or metals.

Similarly, when we throw ourselves in to being united together with God, we are bound to change. We will be changed by God, but we are also changed by the people we are united with, their life experiences, their personal needs, their lessons and every interaction, they change us.

Most importantly, when you add oxygen and fuel to a fire, the initial heat that you put in (like a flint spark or a tiny burning of a match) grows. And so too, when we add ourselves and one another in to the

work of unity the aspect of God increases. God needs to be there to get true Christian Unity working together, but it is also the thing that should become most apparent to those outside of the church.

The Bible never says that we should become united as Christians, instead it says we are united through our faith and need to act like it. The Bible records that we should “Strive for full restoration, encourage one another, be of one mind, live in peace.” (2Corinthians 13:11), and that we should “make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification.” (Romans 14:19). We should “Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves,” (Philippians 2:3). In John’s gospel we find the reason why we should do this: “By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.”

CHURCH ANNIVERSARY (report sent to SEBA)

Our two-fold celebration at the end of May was a joyous occasion though sadly many of the people invited were unable to come. This report has been submitted to our South Eastern Baptist Association (SEBA) and will probably appear on their website.

This year marks 100 years since Farnborough BC became affiliated to the Baptist Union. We are holding various celebratory events throughout the year, mostly to increase our visibility and contacts in our community of North Camp. We have also made

plans for 'Project 100', which involves a vision to equip the building for the next 100 years.

For many years we have prayed for the church, situated on a corner plot, to be a beacon of God's light and love within the community; we were recently told of a 'picture' given to a visiting preacher, of the church being like a well on the street corner bubbling up eternal life to the thirsty passers-by. The building is only the place from which this life emerges, but we plan to improve the present use and reduce the carbon footprint of the building while looking to an ecologically sustainable future, with acoustic work, new energy-efficient heating, and solar panels. We are hoping to complete the works over the summer holidays..

This year is also the 35th anniversary of the Church being reconstituted as a Baptist Church (after a few years of closure). That was on May 29th 1987; so on May 29th [2022 a joyful double celebration took place. All three ministers since 1987 were](#) there: Ralph Hanger, our first minister after re-opening, led the service, and John Layzell and Josh Waldock took part; Mike Pusey (minister prior to closure) attended the service, as did a number of past members and friends. A display of the church's history added interest both before and after a meal was enjoyed together.

We thank our faithful God for the past, look to Him for the present, and trust Him for the future..

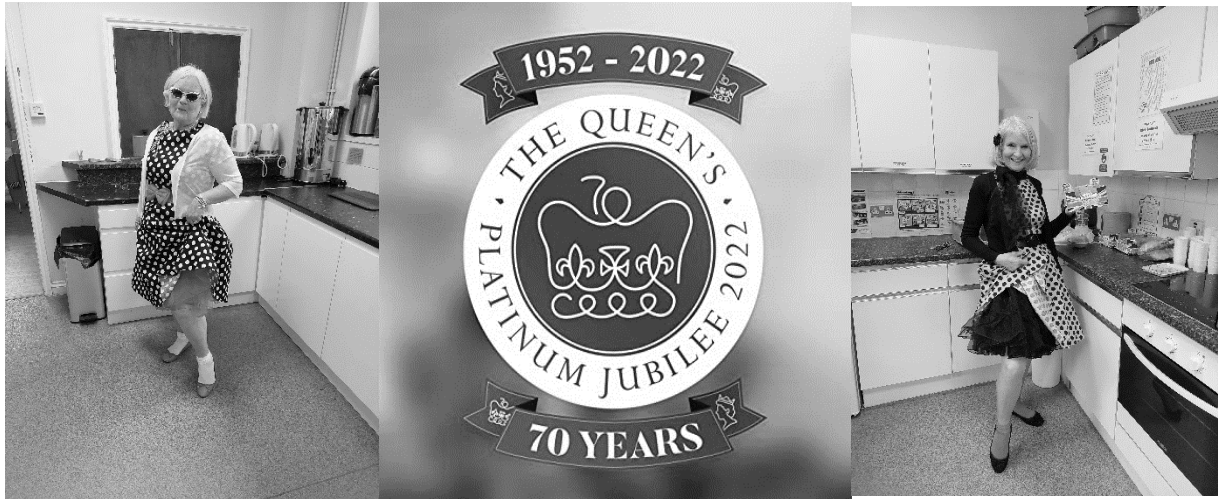
Great teamwork!

Just for fun – here is the history of the scone.

THE FIRST SCONES

Scones are thought to have originated in Scotland in the early 1500s and the first known print reference was made by a Scottish poet in 1513. Scones were originally made using oats, shaped into a large round, and scored into four or six wedges. They were then griddle baked over an open fire, although today's versions are made with flour and baked in the oven.

The word is thought to have originated from the Dutch "schoonbrot," meaning fine white bread; and the closely related German "sconbrot," which means fine or beautiful bread.

THE HEIGHT OF FASHION

Around 1840, scones became an essential part of the fashionable ritual of afternoon tea in England.

This was popularised by Anna, the Duchess of Bedford, who was a close friend of Queen Victoria.

One afternoon she requested some 'light food,' which included tea, biscuits, and scones.

It's said that she enjoyed it so much that she ordered it every afternoon and the English ritual of 'Afternoon Tea' was born.

JAM OR CREAM FIRST?

Much debate surrounds the 'correct' way to eat a scone, so how do you eat yours?

Cream tea is immensely popular in both Devon and Cornwall, but the main difference is how they eat their scones. In Cornwall, jam is added first to allow it to sink into the warm scone and then clotted cream is added on top.

In Devon, it's the other way round, clotted cream is spread first to create a barrier between the runny jam and the scone.

Continuing my study of:

Jesus in the Psalms

Psalm 4

The exact situation of how David came to write this Psalm is unknown, but Israel was facing a severe famine.

In response, many Israelites made sacrifices to false Gods and idols praying to them to bring rain and stop the drought. These false God worshippers looked to any god, person, religion, or any means to solve their problem.

David pictured them as selling their allegiance to anyone with a decent answer to their question – who will show us some good. But David's response to this famine is different. He invites Israel to rest, to be silent and to fear the one true God.

While everyone else may be running around trying to solve their problems through works and sacrificing to false gods, David said he will lay down in peace and go to sleep because he trusts God.

David finds rest in a time of chaos. He finds plenty in a time of scarcity. Even though David and his people may experience a lack of food, dwindling supplies and a shortage of everyday provisions, he still trusts God.

This is how David can say he has more joy with God in a famine, than those without God at a rich banquet. David would rather be poor and with the true God than rich with idols.

Our world is still filled with false gods who offer solutions to all the modern famines we face. Consider what people refer to as a personal drought, when all the purpose joy and friends in life dry up.

It's so easy to turn to anyone who we think can show us some good.

Whether it be personal, self-discovery, sexual exploration, or a departure from religious faith altogether, there are plenty of false gods that say they can make us happy.

The obvious problem is they, like the idols worshipped in Psalm 4, are fake and powerless.

We need something real. That is why David asked to see Gods face. To experience His nearness. To know his presence.

The Good News is that Jesus is described as the very light of Gods face. Jesus is the only one who proves Himself as truly God.

He is not a picture of an imagined god, called an idol, Jesus is the exact image of the true God.

Jesus proves this by going through a famine no human could survive. The drought of the grave.

When Jesus lay down to sleep in the tomb, God made him dwell in safety by raising Him from death.

When physical or personal famines enter our lives, we don't have to work, toil, and find ways to solve them. We can rest in the knowledge that if God can conquer the grave, He can conquer anything.

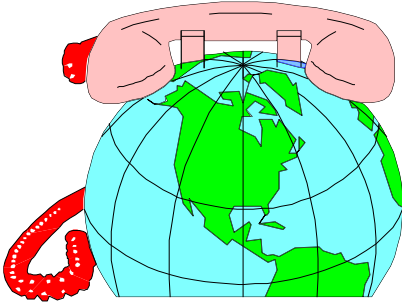
When we rest in what Jesus has done for us then we can have joy even when things are bad.

I pray that the Holy Spirit would open our eyes to see the God who alone is able to solve the famines of our lives, and may we see Jesus who is the only one who can pull us out of whatever drought we are in by the Good News of what He did for us on the cross. Amen!

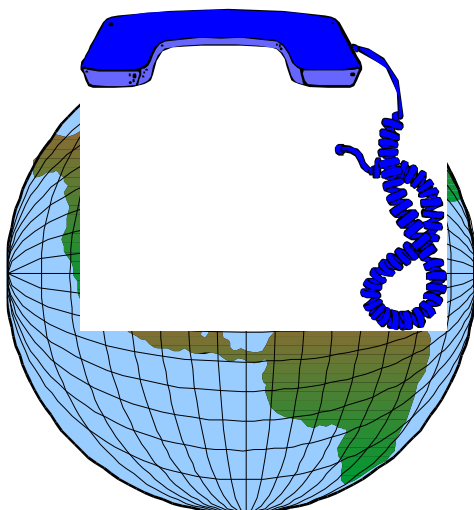

pray that God will give us some very treasured times before we say goodbye to one of our vows.

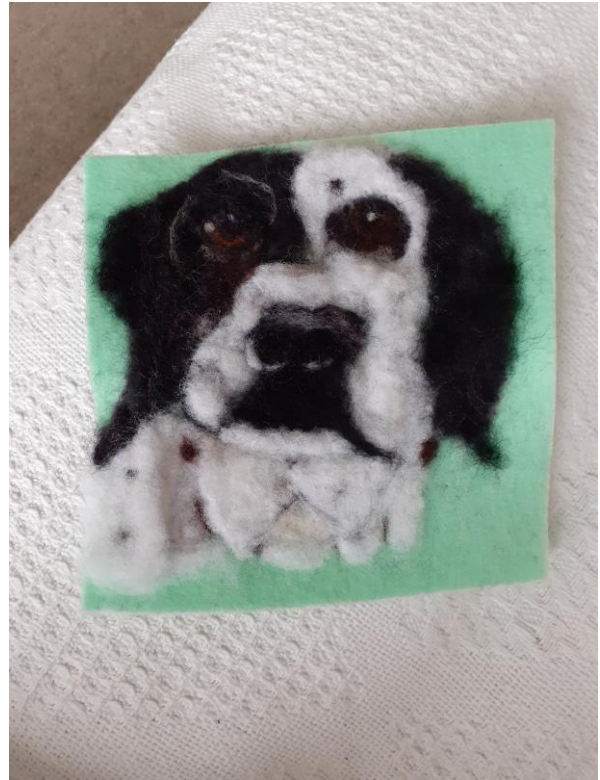
